FOREIGN LANGUAGE

- o **it will probably sound like I'm speaking a FOREIGN LANGUAGE -**
 - o using words & phrases that sound so ALIEN to you
- o **it's a PROCESS -**
 - o no one "gets it" on his/her 1st pass
 - o no one starts speaking "fluent MLA" on the 1st day
 - o *it takes time, patience, & practice
- o **PRACTICE makes perfect (at least, familiar) -**
 - o the more you use it, the more familiar it becomes
 - o it starts to make sense

FOREIGN LANGUAGE

- o **USE IT or lose it**

- o practice, practice, practice

- o this is why we will do several exercises, abstracts, & essays

- o otherwise, like a foreign language, you will start to lose what you've gained

- o **there is a "GRAMMAR" to MLA**

- o a set of rules that govern when to do what

- o they are precise -- this is exactly where the period goes, e.g.

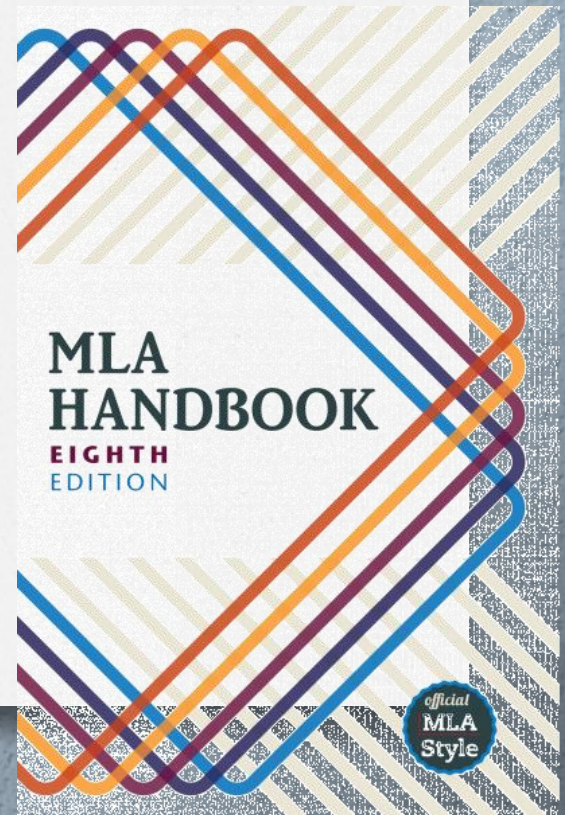
- o once you get "the hang of" these rules, everything starts making sense

- o **MLA:**

- o others = **APA** (social sciences), **Chicago** (history), **APSA** (political science), **CSE** (natural science), **IEEE** (engineering & computer sci.)

- o **8th edition**

- o “simplify”

- o digital sources

- o **Creating bibliographic citations**
 - o 1 citation
 - o 3 main parts
 - o 9 core elements



WORKS CITED

o **9 core elements:**

1. **Author.**
2. **Title of Source.**
3. **Title of Container,**
4. **Other contributors,**
5. **Version,**
6. **Number,**
7. **Publisher,**
8. **Publication date,**
9. **Location.**



WORKS CITED

o (1) Author.

- o 0 author = leave blank & move on to next section
- o 1 author = Last, First.
- o 2 authors = Last, First, and First Last.
- o 3+ authors = Last, First, et al.
- o NO: professional degrees or titles
- o IF your focus is on a role other than author, add that after the name:
 - o Last, First, editor.
- o + period



REVERSE
the FIRST

WORKS CITED

o (2) Title of Source.

o "QUOTATION MARKS"

o part of a whole ("short")

o articles, chapters, blogs, songs, episodes, short stories, essays, photographs, 1-act plays, short poems

o *ITALICS*

o the whole; a self-contained work ("long")

o books, movies, video games, court documents, plays, novels, pamphlets, brochures, sculpture, painting

o + period

WORKS CITED

- o **Container:**
- o **“contains” a number of works**
- o **“contains” your source**
- o **journal, magazine, newspaper, site**
- o ***some sources have 2+ containers**
 - o databases
 - o e-books
 - o internet streaming services

WORKS CITED

o **Container:**

o **this part**

o gives info re: where & how to find your source

o has 7 parts

o each separated by a COMMA

o ***BUT*** *not all will be relevant to your source*

o in that case, leave it blank

WORKS CITED

- o (3) *Title of Container*,
 - o your source = part of a whole
 - o that whole = the container
 - o italicized + comma
 - o *journal, magazine, newspaper, site, TV series, CD*
 - o *Shakespeare Quarterly, Newsweek, New York Times,*
- o + **comma**

WORKS CITED

o (4) Other contributors,

o roles other than “author”

o edited, translated, illustrated, narrated, adapted, introduced

o not abbreviated

o + “by” First Last,

o capitalized after period (1st word only)

o not capitalized after comma

o *Foucault’s Pendulum*. Translated by William Weaver,

o *Umberto Eco Tribute Page*, edited by John Schmigliesa,

o + comma

WORKS CITED

- o (5) Version,
 - o special edition of a work, movie, video game
 - o version of software or phone app
 - o not abbreviated
 - o capitalized after period (1st word only)
 - o not capitalized after comma
 - o book: *The Da Vinci Code*. Illustrated edition,
 - o site: *Dan Brown Fan Site*, version 2.0,
- o + comma

WORKS CITED

- o (6) Number,

- o Scholarly Journals often have volume and issue numbers

- o as do Multi-Volume Works (too long to fit in one)

- o VOLUME & ISSUE

- o vol. + comma + no. + comma

- o vol. 5, no. 22,

- o SEASON & EPISODE of TV shows

- o season 10, episode 3,

- o + comma

WORKS CITED

- o (7) Publisher,

- o BOOKS, TV SHOWS, MOVIES—

- o abbreviate “University Press” as UP

- o omit words/abbreviations for Co., Inc., Corp., Ltd.

- o TV shows & movies often have multiple sources –

- o choose the primary producer or distributor (listed 1st)

- o + comma

WORKS CITED

o (7) Publisher,

o SITES —

o publisher, school, sponsoring organization

o look for the Copyright Date © at the bottom of the page

o *omit* publisher for journals, magazines, newspapers

o *omit* publisher for personal blogs

o *omit* publisher for site with the same name*

o *omit* publisher for “warehouses” not responsible for the content or work (**databases, YouTube, WordPress*)

o + **comma**

WORKS CITED

- o (8) **Publication date,**
 - o DATE of PUBLICATION = latest date of publication
 - o (revised, edited)(most recent edition or version)
 - o ***FORMAT***
 - o Day Month Year
 - o 10 Oct. 2010,
 - o Jan., Feb., Mar., Apr., May, June, July, Aug., Sept., Oct., Nov., Dec.
 - o TV Shows & Movies: = year only
 - o *if your focus = on the historical context of the episode, then full date
 - o *DVD sets = year of DVD release + comma + disc #.
 - o 2012, disc 2.
 - o COMMENTS: (to online articles or posts) = time of post, too
 - o 19 Oct. 2016, 11:47 a.m.,
- o + comma

WORKS CITED

o (9) Location.

o PRINT SOURCES:

o Page Numbers—

o “p.” for page or “pp.” for pages

o pp.36-75.

o CONTINUOUS PAGINATION:

o use the range of pages—

o pp. 44-80, pp. 123-34, pp. 1176-91

o limit the 2nd number to 2 digits (132-45)

o NON-CONTINUOUS PAGINATION:

o use the 1st page number and "+"

o pp.65+

o + period

WORKS CITED

o (9) Location.

o ONLINE SOURCES: (Web sites)

o a) DOI (Digital Object Identifier)

o *preferred

o doi + colon + number + period

o b) permalink

o under the “share” button

o c) URL (Universal Resource Locator)

o do not use shortened link

o do not use “http://” for any URL

o do not use <carets> around any URL

o *break URLs after single slash (/) only

o + period

WORKS CITED

- o **(10) OPTIONAL INFORMATION-**
- o **some additional info might be necessary to help readers find your source – esp. if source is updated**
- o ***Access Date**
 - o same format as the Publication Date
 - o after the period following the Location.
 - o “Accessed” + date.

o WEB SITE:

- o Last, First. "Article." *Site Name*, Site Publisher If Needed, Date of Publication (most recent), Location (DOI or permalink or URL).
- o "Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy." *SayOw55*, Seau Foundation, 2016, www.sayow55.org/CTE/causes/24802. Accessed 19 Oct. 2016.

TYPES of SOURCES

o SCHOLARLY JOURNAL:

o PRINT COPY:

o Last, First. "Article." *Journal Name*, volume number, issue number, Date of Publication (most recent), page numbers.

o ONLINE VERSION:

o Last, First. "Article." *Journal Site*, volume, issue number, Date of Publication, page # if there, URL. Access Date.

o **Stephens, Robert. "Bottom's Dream." *Shakespeare Online Journal*, vol. 8, no.12, 1 Apr. 2009, pp. 43-54, www.ShakespeareOJ.org/April/2009/MSND/Bottom.pdf. Accessed 23 Apr. 2016.**

TYPES of SOURCES

o NEWSPAPER, MAGAZINE:

- o Last, First. “Article.” Newspaper, date, page number/s. °for the page number, include the section if it has one
- o add the **edition** after the date
- o add [**city**] after the name
- o replace p.# with the **URL. Access date.** if online
- o **Paulson, Robert. “Fight Club Suspected in Chicago.” *The Chicagoan*, 11 Nov. 1999, morning edition, pp. A6-7.**

TYPES of SOURCES

o DATABASE ARTICLES:

o *2 CONTAINERS:

o 1.the original publishing information

o 2.the database from which you retrieved the article

o Last, First. "Article." *Journal Name*, volume number, issue number, Date of Publication (most recent), page numbers. *Database Name*, Location (DOI or permalink or URL).

TYPES of SOURCES

o GOVERNMENT:

- o the government hierarchy is used as the "Corporate Author"
- o start with the government & then proceed – in hierarchal order – through the agencies, bureaus, departments, divisions – until you get to your source
 - o Matryoshka (nesting) dolls: pecking order
 - o each item separated by a COMMA
 - o government = federal (United States) or state (Maryland)
- o **United States, Dept. of Health and Human Services, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, National Center for Emerging and Zoonotic Infectious Diseases, Division of Vector-Borne Diseases. + then the article.....**



TYPES of SOURCES

o BOOK:

- o Last, First. *Book Title*. Publisher, date of publication.
- o (a period comes after the book title because it is a self-contained whole)
 - o *no city of publisher
 - o most recent date of publication
- o Stephens, Robert. *Shakespeare's Maimed Rites*. Bottom Books, 2016.

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Parenthetical Citations

PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS

o **Why We Document:**

- o “college” = high standards of writing & research
- o “conversation”: researchers are part of a conversation with researchers from the past, present, and future
- o “credibility”: citing our sources shows respect for ourselves as scholars, for our school & its education reputation, for our subject, and for the source’s author

PARENTHETICAL CITATIONS

o **Why We Document:**

o A very practical reason:

o To play *Research Frogger*

- o Our **citation** gets readers to our **Works Cited page**
- o Our **WC page** gets them to the **source**
- o Where they can find our **material in its context**

CORE ELEMENTS

(1) <u>AUTHOR</u>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• just the Last Name• (when not used in the Lead-In Expression)
(2) <u>PAGE NUMBER</u>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• <i>no</i> “p.” or “pp” for page numbers• just the numeral• found in print versions of books, magazines, journals, newspapers• seen onscreen with numbered pages, .pdf files
Example:	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• (Smith 679).• *no punctuation between elements...ordinarily

CORE ELEMENTS

o **AUTHOR:**

- o ****The 1st item (*correctly*) on the Works Cited page = The 1st item in the Parenthetical Citation****

WORKS CITED PAGE CITATION:

Smith, Jayne. *The Green Scheme*. Free Thinking, 2017.

PARENTHETICAL CITATION:

(Smith 89).

CORE ELEMENTS

- o **If there's no AUTHOR:**
- o ****The 1st item (*correctly*) on the Works Cited page = The 1st item in the Parenthetical Citation****

WORKS CITED PAGE CITATION:

“Vote for Smith.” *Jayne Smith for Congress. Green Tea Party. 5 Aug. 2017. www.greentea.org/Election2017/JayneSmith.html.*

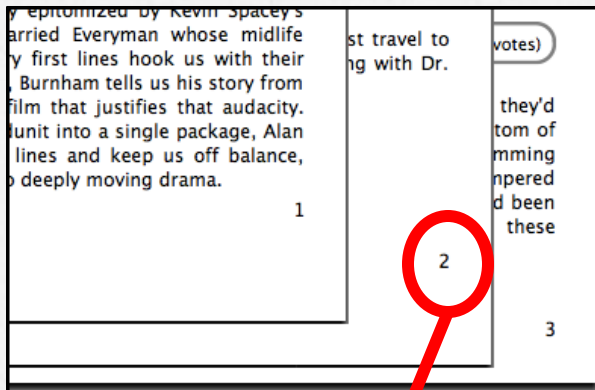
PARENTHETICAL CITATION:

(“Vote for Smith” 2).

CORE ELEMENTS

- o **PAGE NUMBER:**

- o **Only if they appear in print or on the screen – not the printer's numbers**



- o **PARENTHETICAL CITATION:**

- o **(Smith 2).**

BONUS INFO: Authors

0 AUTHORS:

- o when a source has NO AUTHOR—
- o use the next item in the Bibliographic Citation (the Works Cited page entry)
 - o usually it is the “Article Title” (keep “QM”)
 - o (but could be the *Book Title*) (keep <i>)
- o the title can be shortened/truncated if it is too long
 - o (*as long as it does not create confusion with another title)
- o EXAMPLE:
 - o (“The Causes and Effects of Fibromyalgia” 45).
 - o (*Neurological Disorders* 462).

BONUS INFO: Authors

2 AUTHORS:

o **when a source has 2 AUTHORS--**

o Last Name + and + Last Name

o (not an ampersand -- &)

o **EXAMPLE:**

o (Lewis and Clark 557).

o (Martin and Lewis 2).

BONUS INFO: Authors

3+ AUTHORS:

- o **when a source has 3 or more AUTHORS--**
 - o Last Name of the 1st author indicated in the source + et al. (“and others”)
 - o the “al” needs a period after it because it is an abbreviation
- o **EXAMPLE:**
 - o (Jeter, et al. 2).
 - o (Fouts, et al. 14).

BONUS INFO: Authors

2+ WORKS by the SAME AUTHOR:

o **Add the next item on the bib. citation--**

o Last Name + comma + Source

o **EXAMPLE:**

o (Loman, “Causes of Depression” 213).

o (Loman, “Overcoming Depression” 89).

BONUS INFO: Authors

2+ WORKS without AUTHORS from SAME SOURCE:

- o **Add the next part of the bib. citation--**
 - o "Article Title" + comma, inside the QM + *Source*
- o **EXAMPLE:**
 - o ("Gluttony," *7DeadlySins.org*, par.2).
 - o ("Avarice," *7DeadlySins.org*, par.9).

BONUS INFO: Authors

2+ AUTHORS with the SAME LAST NAME:

o **Add the First Initial--**

o 1st initial + period + Last Name

o (use the *full 1st name* if the initials are the same)

o **EXAMPLE:**

o (C. Van Doren 98).

o (M. Van Doren 114).

BONUS INFO: Locators

- o **If your source does not have page numbers**
- o **Then use some other fixed *numbered* locator to help readers locate the context of your sources**
 - o Numbered paragraphs
 - o Numbered chapters, sections, parts, books
- o ***add a comma**

BONUS INFO: Locators

- o **PARAGRAPH NUMBERS:**

- o **numbered onscreen**

- o Last Name + comma + par.#

- o **EXAMPLE:**

- o (Smith and Wesson, par.5).

- o (Smith and Wesson, pars.1-3).

BONUS INFO: Locators

o **CHAPTER, SECTION, PART, BOOK #s:**

o **numbered onscreen**

o Last Name + comma + ch.# (or sec.#, pt.#, bk.#)

o **EXAMPLE:**

o (Thompson, ch.2).

o (Ruger, secs.7-8).

o (Colt, pts.44-45).

o (Winchester, bk.9).

BONUS INFO: Locators

- o **VIDEO TIME CODES:**
- o **for audio or video TIME-BASED MEDIA, use the TIME CODE for the location**
 - o videos, movies, podcasts
 - o songs, recorded lectures
- o **hour + colon + minute + colon + second**
- o **EXAMPLE:**
 - o *(Fight Club 00:54:23).*
 - o *(Durden 01:32:48).*



BONUS INFO: Locators

- o *if your source has NO numbered parts
- o **then you cannot use locators**
 - o instead, describe the location in the LEAD-IN EXPRESSION
 - o (if the author is in the Lead-In, too, then no citation)
- o **EXAMPLE:**
 - o In the third paragraph of Ebert's review,
 - o Under the subheading 'Symptoms,' Smith....
